








Rotarun – 80 years young




- Established in winter of 1940-1941 by ski pioneers Jim Hurst, Bob Jackson and Bill Mallory.
 - Built the first tractor pully rope tow.
- 1948 Swiss Olympic skier Janett Ann Winn when she started to teach local kids how to ski
- 1958 ski hill coined 'Rotarun' after the Hailey Rotary Club
- 1964 Arkoosh Family established Rotarun Ski Club 501 © 3.
 - First top to bottom J Bar installed and warming hut built.
- 1966 Arkoosh family donates Rotarun land to Blaine County with a 99 year lease.
- 2001 Replaced JBar with Dopplymayer Poma Lift taken from Austrian town hill.
- 2017 SVSEF takes over ski area management. Maintains ski area as a separate nonprofit organization.
- 2019/20 snowmaking and grooming infrastructure installed
- 2020 Rotarun presents at annual SVED conference



Industry Insight


- In the United States, up to 150 ski areas are failing to thrive and may not survive more than 5 seasons. That represents over 30% of the current industry. Top reasons include minimal investments, no destination traffic, and a reliance on natural snow. (Curbed)
- 4 of 5 beginner skier and riders do not continue with the sport. (20% conversion rate for the Industry)
- Millennial and Gen Z participants ski and ride less than prior generations.
 "It takes two millennials to replace a baby boomer"
- As daily ticket prices go up, and revenue yields go down, beginners are losing footing.

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



- 1,920 lift accessed terrain
- 3,300+ acres of permitted terrain
- 6 lifts
- 64 named runs
- 340" of snow
- 18,000 acres of snowcat skiing terrain
- Endless miles of snowmobile terrain for guided tours & rentals
- Opened in December of 1961

Recent News

- DeBoer family transitions ownership to local Idaho Group
- New group led by Bob Looper, Brundage Board President
- All have strong ties to Idaho and McCall area
- Many have been long time season passholders
- Still independent and family owned
- Positions resort for future growth while maintaining the vision of a friendly, family-oriented resort

Covid Plan

- Summer beat all expectations
 - Communicate early and often with employees and guests
- Preparing for Winter
 - Re-envisioning every experience with the focus of reducing risk for staff, guests and community while still
 providing a great experience
- Some Winter Assumptions
 - Planning on more regional visitation
 - Increased population in McCall (Second Homeowners deciding to stay for winter)
 - Planning on more mid-week visitation
- Capacities
 - On-Mountain not the problem
 - Pinch point identification and planning

Indoor capacity challenges & solutions

- F&B outlets all reduced to 40%-50% of occupancy
- Limiting access
 - No 'hanging out inside'
- New outdoor lockers
- New outdoor spaces with firepits
- New outdoor 'Grab-n-Go' food options
- New/additional 'mobile' trailer bathrooms
- New employee locker room trailers
- Additional parking capacity added
























WE ARE A COMMUNITY

Covid-19 Protocols

Practice social distancing

- Get ready for the day at your vehicle.
- Lift lines and loading will be different.
- 6' from those who are not with your group.
- Seating capacity at all mountain lodges and restaurants will be reduced.
- Reservations will be taken for the Roundhouse and Averill's.

Face coverings are mandatory

- Lift Lines.
- Loading and unloading chair
- Inside all buildings except while eating or drinking.
- Outside when social distancing cannot be maintained.
- During all SnowSports lessons and programs.

Cleaning & Hygiene

- Employees health checked and recorded daily.
- Quarantine protocols in place.
- Continual disinfecting of public areas and surfaces.
- Employees must have face coverings when dealing with guests and other staff.
- Bags, Packs and personal items can be stored in safe, secure and sanitary bag check.

Includes, bowls, glades, chutes and a 4200' extension of the Broadway Run.


Broadway lift rises almost 1600 vertical feet and extends for over a mile.



What is Leave No Trace

LNT is a non profit designed to educate people venturing into the outdoors about how to minimize their impacts on the natural resources (public lands).



Redfish Lake overcrowding - summer 2020

Why is it so important?

- Increased backcountry users
- Crowded trailheads and trails
- New users
- Increased accidents/rescues
- More trash and potential for infected water sources



Redfish Lake Shuttle - summer 2020

Plan Ahead and Prepare

- Check the avalanche advisory bulletin
- Be prepared for bad weather and self-rescue
- Route planning
- Beacon, shovel, probe
- Educated on how to travel in the backcountry



SVG Level 1 course learning to

Travel and Camp on Durable Surfaces

- Use previous skin tracks
- Camp out of run out zones, away from cornices, or other hazards
- Set up tent away from high use areas
- Camp 200' away from streams and lakes (protect water sources from contamination

Dispose of Waste Properly

- Pack It In, Pack It Out!
- Take out all food scraps and trash
- Take out solid human waste and toilet paper (wag bags)
- Dismantle all snow shelters and naturalize area before leaving campsite



Leave What You Find

- Leave rocks, plants, wildlife, historical or cultural artifacts the way you found them
- Let nature's sounds prevail.
 Keep loud voices to a minimum.
- Take pictures, Leave only footprints.



Minimize Campfire Impacts

- Campfires cause lasting effects on the environment
- Use a backcountry stove instead
- Use only down dead wood for fires and put them out. Spread cold ashes.
- Down break limbs off trees (habitat for wildlife)



Respect Wildlife

- Winter is a vulnerable time for wildlife - difficult to travel and no sufficient food sources
- Observe wildlife from a distance and avoid when possible
- Protect wildlife, by storing your food securely



Be Considerate of other Visitors

- Be respectful of others
- When stopped, don't block the trail
- Separate skin tracks from bootpacks or snowshoe tracks
- Traverse slopes in one track
- Pick up waste after your pets (especially in the skintrack)
- Lower group size or choose less traveled terrain

Be Considerate of other Visitors

- Don't ski down over other groups ascending the slope
- Use established skin tracks and make them use-able for the future (low angle tracks)
- Be equipped for self-rescue (lower impact of emergency responders during pandemic)



We're here to Help

- Educate users on backcountry etiquette
- Provide avalanche education





- Instruct users on how to use their gear properly and travel in the backcountry
- Provide rescue courses
